Legal Front - Follow the cases at <u>JustSecurity.org</u>.

- March 6, 23 Dem AGs team up to fight the OG.
- March 6, federal judge <u>reinstated</u> Gwynne Wilcox, the Democratic NLRB member who was fired in February. The board now has a quorum and can conduct business.
- March 6, Second federal judge <u>extends block</u> preventing the kakistocracy from freezing funding.
- March 5, in a 5-4 decision, the Supreme Court <u>rejected</u> the kakistrocracy's bid to avoid paying USAID contractors.
- March 5, lawyers suing DOGE <u>filed</u> a new brief using evidence from T's March
 5 speech as proof that Musk is running DOGE illegally. (White House staffers
 have been trying to shield Musk from lawsuits by, for example, <u>claiming</u> a
 woman on vacation in Mexico is running DOGE.)
- March 5, the Merit Systems Protection Board decided to expand their original decision that six USDA workers had been illegally terminate to include 5,000 additional USDA workers.

- March 6, Musk's DOGE <u>sued</u> after using U.S. marshals to take over the U.S.
 African Development Foundation.
- Feb. 27, a federal judge <u>decided</u> the Office of Personnel Management's mass firings of probationary employees was Illegal. March 4, OPM <u>altered</u> its firing memo to say that agencies can fire workers but OPM doesn't reverse probationary worker firings. Federal offices <u>now have until September 13</u> to determine how to reduce staff.

His Revenge Tour

- On Feb 25, the OG signed a memo suspending the federal building security clearances of employees at the Covington & Burling law firm in Washington, D.C.
- On March 6, the OG <u>canceled</u> the federal clearance for Perkins Coie law firm employees and ordered federal agencies to cancel contracts with the firm. The effects of the security clearance suspension. It is absurd to bar a law firm's lawyers from entering a federal court house. Their crime: they represented Hillary Clinton. So far, no other law firm has stepped up to defend either firm.

Our Government

- The many unpopular things the OG is doing right now.
- All the things done to help Putin
 - After the Friday ambush, Ukraine's Zelenskyy <u>says</u> its "time to make things right" with U.S. and seeks the OG's "strong leadership" for peace.
 - U.S. and Russia <u>agree to restore embassy staffing</u> in high-level talks on Ukraine war. Russia sees talks with US as an <u>opening to rebuild its spy</u> networks.
 - The U.S. has <u>cut off</u> intelligence sharing with Ukraine that helps on the battlefield
 - The OG himself <u>ordered</u> a "pause" on military aid to Ukraine, causing equipment that was en route to be returned.
 - The U.S. considers <u>easing sanctions</u> on Russia after Oval Office Meltdown last Friday.
 - Hegseth halts cyber operations against Russia, adding to an ugly pattern.
 - The U.S. has ended support for rebuilding and repairing Ukraine's energy grid (a prime Russian target).
 - The U.S. has sided with Russia on U.N. resolutions.
 - The U.S. is now <u>advocating</u> for Russia to join the G7 and <u>objected</u> to the phrase 'Russian aggression' in G7 statement on the third anniversary of Russia's invasion of Ukraine.
 - In February, the U.S. <u>cut Ukraine out of peace talks</u> with Russia.
 - USAID

- Senior USAID leader Nick Enrich warned Rubio and other appointees of the hundreds of thousands of deaths that will occur from closing the agency. Now he's been put on leave. It appears that Rubio has issued waivers to at least pay contractors for work done as of Feb. 13, but "USAID leadership has failed to process the disbursement of funds."
- In blow to the OG, Supreme Court <u>frees up</u> billions in USAID money but gave the kakistocracy time to sort its payments out. In the 5-4 ruling, Roberts and Barrett joined Sotomayor, Kagan and Jackson.

Defense

- Vicious Pentagon press secretary <u>faces calls to resign</u> over antisemitic posts.
- **DOJ** so far, Pam Bondi and the OG have:
 - Ordered a scorched-earth purge of any of the DOJ's 115,000 employees who don't like the OG.
 - <u>Established</u> a "Weaponization Working Group" to review the actions of
 officials who investigated the OG at both the state and federal levels,
 including Jack Smith and DA Alvin Bragg, and NY AG Letitia James.
 - <u>Limited</u> enforcement of the Foreign Agents Registration Act to "more traditional espionage by foreign government actors," rather than the crimes, for example, that the OG's advisor, Paul Manafort, committed.
 - <u>Disbanded</u> the task force to fight foreign interference from China,
 Russia and others in our elections.
 - Closed the KleptoCapture Unit that seized Russian oligarch assets.
 - <u>Sued</u> NY AG Letitia James and Gov. Kathy Hochul for a state law that allows undocumented people to get a driver's license.
 - Ordered the dismissal of the SDNY case against NY Mayor Adams, resulting in the <u>resignation</u> of at least six prosecutors. Judge Daniel Ho asked Paul Clement to argue against the dismissal, with a hearing set as early as March 14.
 - Released the Epstein files to much fanfare something conspiracists have been demanding for years. But the release was a bust in that the release consisted of information that was already known, such as flight logs (with the OG's name among them). Now Bondi says she was misled, and another release is coming.
 - Today, two federal SDNY prosecutors who worked on the Eric Adams case were placed on leave and escorted out of their workplace.
 - Office of the U.S. Attorney for Washington, D.C.
 - The interim U.S. Attorney for Washington, D.C., Ed Martin, planned to investigate Sen. Chuck Schumer for saying in 2020 that two conservative justices had "released the whirlwind" and would "pay

- the price" for overturning Roe. Now, Martin has <u>dropped</u> the idea. This counts as good news!
- From Rollingstone.com: The OG "is working to 'drain' the D.C. prosecutor's office and make it MAGA."
- Interim D.C. U.S. attorney Ed Martin is <u>threatening</u> anyone who opposes Elon Musk's DOGE cronies.
- Washington, D.C. appeals court <u>finds</u> that the kakistocracy provided enough "cause" to remove Hampton Dellinger as the Special Counsel of the U.S. Office of Special Counsel. The court did not sign its decision.

• FBI

- On a Feb. 27 teleconference call with the heads of the FBI's 55 field offices, Patel <u>suggested</u> that he wants the FBI to establish a formal relationship with Ultimate Fighting Championship (UFC) to develop programs for agents to improve their physical fitness.
- Top FBI official, James Dennehy, <u>forced out</u> after questioning pursuit of agents who investigated Jan. 6.
- Now FBI director, Kash Patel took \$25k for role in Russia-linked anti-FBI film.
- New deputy FBI director Dan Bongino previously <u>called for</u> imprisoning Democrats.

State

Feb. 25, the OG announced that he is <u>replacing</u> the EB-5 visa with a \$5 million "gold card" for wealthy immigrants. The EB-5 visa required an investment of \$1 million that will create or preserve 10 permanent full-time jobs for U.S. workers. Commerce Secretary Lutnick was light on details about how applicants will be vetted.

Health and Human Services

- RFK Jr. performs astonishing 180 on vaccines after years of misinformation, saying that vaccination is a personal decision that can protect individuals and communities. Still, RFK Jr. favors cod liver oil for its Vitamin A content, but experts say Vitamin A is only helpful in people who are already Vitamin A deficient. Nine states have measles outbreaks: Texas (where one unvaccinated child has died), New Mexico, New Jersey, Alaska, California, Georgia, Kentucky, New York and Rhode Island, and a total of 164 cases. Older adults may want to consider getting a booster.
- CDC <u>rescinds termination notice</u>, calls about 180 fired employees back.

Veterans Affairs

 March 5, the Department of Veterans Affairs is <u>planning to cut</u> more than 80,000 workers - many of them veterans. • In February, Sec. of Veterans Affairs, Doug Collins, proudly announced the cancellation of 875 contracts, including the cancellation of safety monitoring of X-ray and MRI machines. If not properly monitored, the entire hospital would be required to shut down. Under pressure from congressional Democrats, the number of cancelled contracts has been whittled down to 585. Of them, VA employees have identified 200 contracts essential to veterans care, such as sterile processing services to decontaminate equipment and medical instruments. Also on the cancellation list: contracts providing required certification and accreditation for stroke centers and follow-up care for cancer patients.

Agriculture

- Nearly 6,000 fired USDA employees just got their jobs back for 45 days.
- Secretary of Agriculture <u>says</u> Americans should farm chickens to combat egg prices.

Interior

 National park staff told to <u>downplay</u> record-breaking 2024 visitor stats as visitors to a national park in Texas face mile-long lines to get in.

Commerce

- With the Atlanta Fed <u>predicting</u> negative 1.5 percent GDP growth in the first quarter, Sec. of Commerce Lutnick <u>proposes a nonsensical fix</u>: remove government spending from GDP calculations.
- The OG is planning an order to take over the USPS and put it in the Commerce Dept., threatening mail voting. <u>Watch</u> voting rights attorney Marc Elias discuss the many implications.

Labor

- March 6, the OG to <u>tap head of anti-union group</u> to run the Office of Labor-Management Standards, which oversees financial disclosures by unions and "union-busting" consultants.
- Whole Foods: How the OG is allowing Amazon to <u>steamroll</u> its grocery store workers' union efforts.

Homeland Security

- Lawyers <u>sue to stop</u> kakistocracy from sending 10 migrants to Guantánamo Bay.
- The kakistocracy <u>has stopped</u> using C-17 and C-130 military planes to deport immigrants India, Guatemala, Ecuador, Peru, Honduras, Panama, and Guantánamo Bay. Each flight to India cost \$3 million, and some flights to Guantánamo Bay cost \$20,000 per migrant.
- T.'s aid freeze <u>disrupted</u> an anti-narcotics program at Mexican ports.
- The kakistocracy is <u>rethinking</u> its Guantánamo immigrant detention plan amid cost issues and power struggles.

 South Texas immigration detention center with capacity for 2,400 people to <u>reopen</u>.

• Education - "I love the poorly educated," - T., Feb. 24, 2016

- The OG has <u>prepare the order</u> to dismantle the Education Department but he hasn't signed it yet. The department manages student loans and distributes money directly to publi schools to help them educate the disabled. <u>Click to see</u> who gets the most money.
- Dept. of Education now has a DEI 'snitch line' where people can report schools that are still honoring DEI.
- The OG <u>vows</u> to deport students over 'illegal protests' and to defund colleges. The Dept. of Education says stop work orders for \$51.4 million in contracts with Columbia University are under consideration, and that more than \$5 billion in grant commitments to that school will be reviewed.

Treasury

- On Feb. 6, the OG signed an executive order laying out a plan to create a sovereign wealth fund for the United States. Doing it won't be so easy.
- On March 6, the OG <u>created</u> a "Strategic Bitcoin Reserve," ordering the
 Treasury Department to set up an office to administer the reserve, which
 will be capitalized with Bitcoin (BTC) confiscated by the government as
 part of criminal or civil asset forfeiture proceedings, Ripple, ethereum,
 Solana, XRP and Cardano tokens. <u>Watch</u> PodSaveAmerica's reaction.
- From <u>Forbes.com</u>: The OG's "Strategic Crypto Reserve and what it means for crypto and you."
- Treasury Secretary Bessent <u>says</u> the American dream is not about 'access to cheap goods,' so there's no need to worry about inflation.

The National Science Foundation

 National Science Foundation <u>rehires</u> half of the employees fired two weeks ago.

EPA

• EPA <u>plans</u> to 'permanently cripple' climate protections in single blow.

General Services Administration

 The kakistocracy <u>took down</u> its list of hundreds of federal buildings targeted for potential sale.

Securities and Exchange Commission

- Crypto exchange Kraken <u>says</u> the SEC is dismissing its lawsuit against Kraken.
- On Feb. 27, the SEC <u>announced</u> the dismissal of its civil enforcement action against Coinbase. the largest U.S. cryptocurrency exchange
- Chinese crypto mogul Justin Sun, who invested \$75 million into the
 OG's coins, is getting a reprieve from the SEC on civil fraud charges.

In Congress

- Congress has two plans for <u>avoiding a government shutdown</u> on March
 14. They're working on a continuing resolution that may last just a few weeks or one that may go through September, as the OG prefers.
- Last week, the House <u>passed</u> a framework for a budget by just one vote.
- Republican lawmakers expand impeachment crusade against federal judges.

The Economy

- Layoffs across the U.S. soar to highest level since 2020, led by DOGE cuts.
- The kakistocracy has <u>disbanded</u> two committees that make sure the economic numbers the government produces are accurate.
- Planned job cuts increased 245% to 172,017 last month, the highest level since
 July 2020, when the economy was in the grips of the COVID-19 pandemic. It
 was the highest February total since the Great Recession 16 years ago.
- The U.S. <u>added</u> 151,000 jobs, short of expectations, as federal workforce shrinks. The unemployment rate rose to 4.1%.
- On Jan. 20, 2025, the Dow Jones Industrial Average (DJI) <u>closed</u> at 43,487.83.
 Today, it closed at 42,801.72.
- Consumer confidence declined by 7.0 points in February to 98.3.

Tariffs

- March 6, Mr. T <u>delays tariffs</u> on many products from Mexico and Canada until April 2.
- Stellantis, Ford and General Motors <u>secured</u> a month-long tariff exemption from the OG, but other Canadian goods imported into the U.S. were subject to a 25% tariff, except for energy, which is taxed at 10%, for two days.
- From the <u>Toronto Star</u>: The OG "is waging economic war on Canada.
 Here's one way we can protect ourselves: ... withholding nickel, cobalt,
 lithium, graphite, copper, and rare earths."
- From <u>Forbes.com</u>: How the OG's "tariffs on Mexico and Canada could impact U.S. gas prices."
- Pete Navarro on Fox "News" <u>claims</u> Canada has been taken over by Mexican drug cartels.

Musk's Bad Day

- A StarShip blew up eight minutes after launch, just like the previous test flight.
- He got demoted. On Thursday, Marco Rubio <u>unleashed his fury</u> on Musk in heated a cabinet meeting while the OG looked on. Finally the OG <u>told</u> the assembled cabinet secretaries, including Musk, that they, not Musk, have the power to hire and fire workers.

The Grift

- The OG is charging millions to hobnob with him at Mar-a-Lago.
- During the transition period, the OG's Store (run by the Trump Organization)
 added 168 new presidential products, for a total of 1,725 items. A \$200 MAGA
 Victory Blanket and \$30 Inauguration Seal Mugs, \$550 45-47 Bling Clutch and
 \$120 45-47 Rocks Glass Set are some of the highlights. If you're on his e-mail
 list, this stuff is marketed to you daily.
- What it's like to be on the OG's fundraising email list.
- The OG's meme coin is down 81% and Melania's is 92% since launch.

Welcoming Criminals

- Musk <u>urges</u> the OG to 'think about' pardoning George Floyd's murderer.
- Facing rape and trafficking charges in Romania, professional misogynist <u>Andrew Tate is back in the U.S.</u> The OG claims to know nothing about it, but Romanian officials <u>say</u> U.S. counterparts brought up the brothers' case with the Romanian government earlier this month. And the OG's special envoy Richard Grenell <u>raised the issue again</u> at a security conference in Munich.

In the World

- Ukraine
 - Listen to Al Franken's interview with war correspondent Tim Mak.
 - Russian drone detonates on Chornobyl nuclear plant containment shell.
 - In their never-ending search for peace, Russia <u>launched</u> the largest drone attack on Ukraine on the eve of the third year of war.
 - The kakistocracy's decision to suspend all military aid to Ukraine was announced without consultation with NATO and was applauded by Russia. Sharing of intelligence about Russia with Ukraine is also suspended. Both suspensions allegedly depend of peace talk progress. In the wake of these suspensions, Russia launched huge strikes on energy targets across Ukraine with drones and cruise missiles. However, the U.K. and France continue to share intelligence with Ukraine.
 - Ukrainian opposition leaders, including the former president and prime
 minister, have met with the OG' representatives, but denied any plan to
 oust Zelenskyy. They expressed support for Zelenskyy and opposed
 holding elections while the war continued. While Zelenskyy's
 approval ratings have dropped during the three-year war, but he remains
 the most popular Ukrainian politician, and his ratings were given a boost
 by the OG's attacks.
 - If elections were held today, Zelenskyy <u>has a 20 percent lead</u> in polls over his nearest opponent.
 - Saudi Arabia will host talks between the U.S. and Ukraine in Jeddah next week, but Saudi Arabia's closeness to Russia is concerning.
- European Union

- With the exception of Hungary and in a "watershed moment", European leaders <u>agree</u>d to an €800 billion defense spend. Slovakia (led by the pro-Russian Robert Fico) was reluctant to agree but came along by wordsmithing the final statement to include exploring "workable solutions" to its ongoing gas supply dispute with Kyiv. In the final statement, EU leaders except Orban <u>affirmed</u> "there can be no negotiations on Ukraine without Ukraine" and that any peace deal must "respect Ukraine's independence, sovereignty and territorial integrity."
- French president Macron <u>says</u> more is needed and that Europe's future <u>can't be decided</u> by Kremlin or White House.

U.K.

- Prime minister Starmer <u>finds</u> subtle way to deal with the OG. After the
 White House ambush on Feb. 28, Starmer got on the phone with both the
 OG and Zelenskyy, trying to patch things up. However, Starmer needs to
 reign in the British ambassador to the U.S., Lord Mandelson, who has
 called for Zelenskyy to give in to the OG.
- For the first time ever, the United States under the O.G., is <u>negotiating</u> directly with Hamas, warning that death awaits Hamas leaders and Gazans if hostages aren't immediately released. (Five American hostages are <u>believed</u> to be alive.) This comes after months of setting deadlines and proclaiming that "all hell will break loose" to no effect. <u>Watch</u> attorney Ben Meiselas discuss.
- Israel <u>faces backlash</u> after halting all aid into Gaza as a method of warfare.
- The OG has <u>signed an order</u> prioritizing U.S. 'resettlement' of white South Africans over 'discrimination,' but they <u>turn his offer down</u>.
