## Understanding One of This Week's Big Stories - Eight Neurologist Visits

On Monday, the *New York Times* added to its list of <u>over 200 anti-Biden stories</u> since the debate by publishing a story implying that President Biden has Parkinson's: "<u>Parkinson's Expert Visited the White House Eight Times in Eight Months</u>."

The White House press corps (particularly CBS News' Ed O'Keefe) attacked White House Press Secretary Karine Jean-Pierre for not answering their questions when in fact White House policy prevented her from confirming that the neurologist named in the NYT hit-piece was Dr. Kevin Cannard.

Later that day, White House physician Dr. Kevin O'Connor <u>released a letter</u> in which he confirmed that the doctor in question was indeed Dr. Kevin Cannard.

Dr. O'Connor confirmed what Jean-Pierre had said: that Dr. O'Conner had seen President Biden three times in three years for his annual physical. The most recent annual physical was on Jan. 17. The results of this physical were <u>released on Feb. 28</u>.

The authors of the *New York Times* article (Peter Baker and Emily Baumgaertner) used <u>White</u> <u>House visitor logs</u> (which are public under Biden but secret under Trump) that provide the name of the visitor but not the purpose of the visit.

But they were too lazy to check President Biden's public travel log. Had they done so, they would have learned that President Biden was not in Washington D.C. on five of the eight days that Dr. Cannard visited the White House.



The authors updated their hit-piece after Dr. O'Connor released his letter. They accused Dr. O'Connor of lying about Dr. Cannard's White House visits:

"Instead, Dr. O'Connor *implied* that most of Dr. Cannard's visits were related to treating other people who work at the White House. 'Prior to the pandemic, and following its end, he has held regular neurology clinics at the White House Medical Clinic in support of the thousands of active-duty members assigned in support of White House operations,' Dr. O'Connor wrote." (Italics mine.)

Nearly two weeks ago, the New York Times editorial board <u>called on President Biden to step</u> <u>aside</u>.

This week, the board finally got around to Trump, writing that <u>Trump is 'unfit to lead.'</u> They didn't call on Trump to "step aside." They called on voters to defeat him regardless of who his opponent might be. For once, we agree. <u>Read Politico's summary</u>.

## **Holding Trump Accountable**

- Manhattan DA Alvin Bragg's Felony Election Interference Case; Judge Juan Merchan presiding.
  - Good News! Trump's golf courses in New Jersey were denied liquor license renewals following his conviction on 34 felonies in New York. The golf courses have temporary licenses in the name of Don Jr. until Trump is actually sentenced.
    - Not having a liquor license will make these golf courses big money losers according to attorney Michael Popok.
- Special Counsel Jack Smith's Jan. 6 case; Judge Tanya Chukan presiding and currently suspended by SCOTUS.

- RNC convention <u>starts on Monday</u>. They've released their "moderate" Trumpcentric platform. Read it <u>here</u>. Read an opinion of it <u>here</u>.
- From ProPublica: How a militant anti-abortion activist is influencing GOP politics.
- This week, the ACLU <u>unveiled its plan</u> to fight potential free speech abuses if Trump is re-elected.
- Ivan Raiklin, a retired Army Reserve lieutenant colonel and former U.S. Defense
  Intelligence Agency employee, who bills himself as the former and would-be
  president's "future secretary of retribution," has a <u>list of 350 Trump political enemies</u>
  he wants to target. Raiklin wants "constitutional" sheriffs in rural, conservative
  counties across the country to detain Trump's political enemies. Or, as he says,
  carry out "live-streamed swatting raids" against individuals on his "Deep State
  target list."
- Trump is trying to <u>distance himself from Project 2025</u> -- but its architects helped shape his RNC party platform.
- Project 2025 contributor <u>makes ominous promise</u> to hackers.
- Project 2025's plan for the DOJ and the Dept. of Education:
  - Refocus the Dept. of Justice, source: The ReidOut, MSBNC this week
    - Initiate legal action against local officials including District Attorneys who refuse to prosecute Trump's orders.
    - Vigorously prosecute "voter registration fraud" and "unlawful ballot correction."
    - Eliminate <u>existing consent decrees</u>, often used to correct out-ofcontrol police departments.
    - Enforce the criminal prohibitions against providers and distributors of abortion pills that use any delivery service.
    - Reorganize and refocus the Civil Rights Division.

- Enforce the death penalty.
- Eliminate the Dept. of Education (Source: The ReidOut on MSNBC this week). Currently, the department provides <u>student loans</u> so young adults can attend college as well as <u>Pell grants</u> for low income college students; <u>grants</u> to <u>local school districts</u> to supplement funding from property taxes, <u>special education state grants</u> to help children with disabilities such as autism; and under Title 1, ensures equal access to education for every individual. Instead, under Project 2025, the federal government would
  - Block-grant federal taxpayer money to states, which will be free to give that money to private, often religious schools.
  - End Title IX enforcement. Title IX protects students from discrimination based on sex in education programs or activities.
  - Enact a "parent bill of rights" ala Moms for Liberty
  - End federal funding of schools that teach about race, racism, gender and sexuality.
  - End administrator positions tasked with "diversity, equity and inclusion."
  - Restore "patriotic education" through reinstatement of the "1776 Commission," which was established under Trump to refute teachings on systemic racism, critical race theory, and deeper examinations of how slavery has affected American society.
  - Require that all public schools require that all of their high-school age students take the Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery. That's the military entrance examination. This requirement would not apply to private schools.
- More food, less regulation: Project 2025's <u>alarming vision for agriculture</u>.

#### U.S. Senate

- Sen. Sherrod Brown (D-OH)'s campaign raised nearly \$13M in the second quarter.
- The senator for Missouri, Josh Hawley (R), <u>loudly proclaimed</u> he's a Christian nationalist. Donate to his excellent Democratic opponent, <u>Lucas Kunce</u>.
- In Alabama, the state of Alabama had argued in a congressional redistricting case that
  only the federal government can bring suits under Section 2 of the Civil Rights Act. That
  is, that there is no private right of action under Section 2 of the Civil Rights Act. Today, a
  federal court refused to dismiss this case. Watch voting rights attorney Marc Elias
  discuss. This is Good News!
- In **Arkansas**, abortion rights organizers vow to fight 'absurd' rejection of ballot measure that would have added abortion rights to the state's constitution. Arkansas Secretary of State John Thurston (R) <u>claimed</u> that organizers failed to provide the state with a list of all paid canvassers who worked to gather petition signatures for the ballot measure, along with other required materials.
- In Minnesota, the <u>state legislature passed its own Voting Rights Act</u> to combat racial discrimination at the ballot box. It also expands polling places on campus, making it easier for students to vote, and allows voters to describe where they live in order to register to vote, benefiting those on Tribal lands and the unhoused. This is Good News!

- In Montana, organizers collected enough signatures to enshrine abortion rights in the state constitution. The GOP Secretary of State told county officials to change the rules and reject the signatures of inactive voters. A lawsuit filed today. Watch voting rights attorney Marc Elias discuss.
- In Nevada, the Washoe County Commission (Reno) with its 3-2 GOP majority voted against certifying two local recount election results. The Democratic Nevada AG said this is not acceptable and filed a case directly with the state's Supreme Court. This is important because the GOP strategy seems to be "gum up the process" to prevent state's election results from being certified, thereby upsetting the process by which a new Congress will be seated in 2025. Watch voting rights attorney Marc Elias discuss.
- In **Ohio**, enough signatures were gathered to put the <u>Citizens Not Politicians Amendment</u> on the ballot. If the initiative passes in November, Ohio will finally have the opportunity to undo years of Republican gerrymanders. This is Good News!
- In Utah in 2018, the voters passed Proposition 4 to ban partisan gerrymandering and require the use of an independent redistricting commission. The GOP repealed Proposition 4 and gerrymandered congressional maps. If Salt Lake City were districted fairly it would have a Democratic or at least be a swing district. The League of Women Voters and the Mormon Women for Ethical Government brought a lawsuit that was dismissed by a lower court. Today, the state's Supreme Court said the dismissal was wrong and sent it back to the lower court for trial. Watch voting rights attorney Marc Elias discuss. This is Good News!
- In Washington
  - Some staffers say Hilary Franz's DNR work <u>prioritized political gain</u>. That's another reason to support Emily Randall in this election.
  - Six quotes to <u>sum up the second WA schools chief candidate</u> debate held Tuesday night.
  - Making WA's long-term care program optional (I-2124) will create costs for state.

### In Wisconsin

## **President Biden and His Administration**

- Good News! President Biden hosted the NATO Summit in Washington this week. NATO celebrated its 75th anniversary.
  - NATO leaders move to 'Trump-proof' the alliance.
  - NATO will take over substantial parts of the various coordinating efforts for Ukraine aid from the U.S.
  - The United States and Germany <u>announced</u> on Wednesday they would <u>begin</u> <u>deploying</u> long-range fire capabilities in Germany in 2026, includin SM-6,
     Tomahawk cruise missiles and hypersonic weapons with a longer range than current capabilities in Europe.

- Ukraine is on an 'irreversible' path to NATO. But only after war with Russia ends.
- Biden <u>announces \$225 million weapons package</u> for Ukraine, including Patriot system.
- Faced with threats from Russia and its Asian supporters, <u>NATO and Indo-Pacific partners get closer</u>.
- <u>Inflation slows</u>, putting pre-election rate cuts firmly on the table.
- Thanks to President Biden's Inflation Reduction Act, the <u>IRS collected over \$1 billion</u> in past-due taxes from millionaires.

## In Congress

#### · Senate -

- Democrats on the Judiciary Committee found that Clarence Thomas took free yacht, helicopter trips in Russia. They've asked the attorney general to investigate the "serious possibility of tax fraud." This is Good News!
- In May, John Barrasso (R-WY) and 18 other Republicans introduced <u>S.4237</u> to <u>eliminate the EV tax credit</u>. Barrasso said the credit benefits the wealthy and therefore should be repealed.
- Senate Republicans used the filibuster to <u>block</u> yet another reproductive rights bill. <u>S.4554</u> the Reproductive Freedom for Women Act, introduced by Sen. Patty Murray (D-WA). It would have "expressed support for protecting access to reproductive health care after the *Dobbs v. Jackson* decision on June 24, 2022." Forty-nine Democrats and Independents voted in favor. New Jersey senator Bob Menendez did not vote (he was attending his bribery trial), nor did Ed Markey (D-MA) and Kristen Sinema (I-AZ). Sen. Chuck Schumer voted against the bill in order to bring it up again at a later time.

## · House -

- AOC <u>filed articles of impeachment</u> against Supreme Court Justices Clarence Thomas and Samuel Alito. This is Good News!
- GOP bill to fund legislative branch <u>fails on House floor</u>. Democrats voted against it because it
- House Republicans <u>voted to reverse new transgender student protections</u>. The Senate is unlikely to take it up and Biden has said he will veto it.
- The House <u>passed a redundant bill to ban noncitizens</u> from voting in federal elections. <u>Five Democrats voted in favor</u> of the bill. <u>H.R.828</u> also imposes voter roll purge requirements. "The bill prohibits states from registering an individual to vote in a federal election unless, at the time the individual applies to register to vote, the individual provides documentary proof of U.S. citizenship". President Biden has vowed to veto the bill in the unlikely event that the Senate takes it up and passes it.
- Anna Paulina Luna's (R-FL) push to fine Garland \$10,000 per day over Biden-Hur tapes <u>failed</u>.

• House Democrats <u>call for investigation</u> into federal funding of crisis pregnancy centers.
